## Stay safe while working with MEWPs

On 23 November 2020, a worker was raising a work platform of a boom lift when he was caught between the guardrail of the boom lift and a roofing structural member.

The Workplace Safety and Health (WSH) Council urges employers to remind their workers on the importance of working safely when working on Mobile Elevated Working Platforms (MEWPs). MEWPs may appear to be a safe and efficient means of providing temporary access to work-at-height activities, however unsafe use can lead to unfortunate accidents such as operators being trapped and crushed between the platform and objects/structures at the work area.

The International Powered Access Federation (IPAF) have published a Safety Message to the industry to help raise awareness of overhead hazards while using MEWPs. Read the IPAF Safety Message here.


