Accident Notification: Worker hit by broken sheet pile

On 15 December 2020, a group of construction workers was tasked to carry out sheet pile extraction within a worksite. While extracting one of the sheet piles, the top part of the sheet pile broke off at its joint and hit one of the workers standing nearby. The worker was pronounced dead at the scene by attending paramedics.


The Ministry of Manpower has commenced investigations into the accident.

Employers, contractors and workers performing similar work activities are advised to take the necessary precautions and put in place risk controls to protect themselves when working with sheet piles. Where multiple lengths of sheet piles are joined by means of welding and/or splicing with plates, the joints should be adequately designed for. Checks should be carried out to ensure that the materials used for the joints are in accordance to the design. Welding works should be carried out by qualified and competent welders. Tests should be carried out thereafter to inspect the welds. Establish and implement a safe work method for carrying out sheet pile extraction. Provide adequate on-site supervision to ensure adherence to the safe work method. Ensure that no persons are near the machinery or equipment being used when installation or extraction of sheet piles are in progress.
