Background



Slips, Trips and Falls (STF) injuries significantly affects the cleaning industry

Strategic Improvements



Strategy to improve cleaners' safety

- Have appropriate content delivery modes
 - Move away from traditional training modes
 - Increase the proportion of interactive/ experiential training
- Provide specific Slips, Trips and Falls
 Prevention content
 - Hone in on STF injuries, the top contributor to workplace major and minor injuries for cleaners





Desired outcomes

- Improved buy-in from learners
 - Greater knowledge retention
- Enhanced awareness of STF prevention
 - 'Protect myself'
 - Knows how and wants to take action to be safe
- Greater advocacy for STF prevention
 - Report near-misses and accidents to supervisors for review
 - Share knowledge and experiences with colleagues





Training Enhancement Recommendations



Incorporate more STF-specific case studies

- Update current cases studies/ include STF case studies involving cleaners
 - What contributed to the STF accident? What is the impact to the worker? How could the accident be prevented?
 - Cite relevant workplace fatalities or serious incidents and recommendations to avoid their recurrence as published in the WSH Council's WSH Alerts and publications, or as reported in the media.
- Position STF safety from the learners' perspective
 - Encourage learners to share about their own experiences with near misses/ accidents at their workplaces
 - 'It can happen to me and my co-workers too'





Greater use of visual aids

- Training aids
 - Put faulty or inappropriate PPE (e.g. worn out safety shoes) alongside PPE in good condition
 - Show cleaning supplies that should not be mixed (e.g. empty bottles of bleach and ammonia-based cleaners)
 - Show faulty circuit boards/ spliced wires when advising learners against modifying cleaning equipment
- Graphics and videos
 - Use STF prevention graphics/ videos to supplement text content in training materials
